

St. Thomas Lutheran Church — Streetsboro, Ohio



We (some of us anyway) spent forty days (remembering that Sundays were not counted) in Lent getting ready for Easter. That penitential season was developed over centuries to be a time when we learn how to pay attention to our sin and its damaging effect on just about every facet of life.

This Lent, in our Sunday worship, we focused on Jesus' teaching in the Sermon the Mount. In our Midweek worship, we dove into the Book of Exodus. In both foci, the issues of sin and grace

came to the fore. Jesus lays out before us the demands of a life lived to His purposes. The Exodus epic reveals that God's loving grace has always underlined everything in the Biblical witness.

All of that was to be preparation for our comprehending anew the glorious message of Easter: The sin that would destroy us has been taken to the cross in Christ and in the power of His resurrection we now have the promise of life — life abundant, life everlasting! We spent forty days "in the wilderness" of Lent, especially when it came to Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, enmeshed in the shadows of sin and death.

Then it was Easter morning! The sun rose to the message that He was not in the tomb! "Christ is risen!" we cried, and echoed back, "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"

So ... now that's over. Or so it is for many.

The church came to recognize that, if forty days were needed to prepare for the victory of Easter, it would take at least fifty days to celebrate His resurrection. That's where we are all this month of May — smack dab in the middle of the days of celebration. Forty of those days remind us that is how long Jesus made Himself manifest after His resurrection before He ascended to the Father. The next ten days remind us that the disciples had to wait that long for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost.

Leave the celebration of the greatest event in human history to a one-day festival? No way!!

We need to hear again and again how Jesus made Himself known to the disciples so we can recognize how He makes Himself known to us today. We need to doubt with Thomas so that we can be invited to touch and see that He is risen indeed. We need to sit around the fire with Him on the shoreline, eating a breakfast of fish and bread so we can realize that every meal is a time to bask in His presence. We need to recall that He is our Good Shepherd, especially in those moments in life when we are struggling. We need His command repeated to love one another. We need to know the peace that He alone can instill in us.

We need to come together in this post-Easter period as much as, if not more than, we needed ro assemble during Lent. Why? Because He is risen! We cannot afford to let that powerfully joyous message to fade from our thinking, our speaking, our doing. These fifty days are a gift; make use of it.

Our Worship This Month

Because Pastor Just will be recovering from the knee replacement surgery done on April 30, we are working to have Guest Pastors for each of the Sundays in May. If we cannot secure the services of a visiting clergy for any of the Sundays, Pastor Just has provided a sermon to be read (more than likely by Steve Hlava), with others providing the worship leadership. If we have no pastor to preside, we will not offer Holy Communion on those Sundays.

May 19 — The Fifth Sunday of Easter

May 26 — The Sixth Sunday of Easter

Sermon: "Blessed Peace"

Texts: Acts 16:9-15; Psalm 67; Revelation 21: 10,22-22:5; John 14:23-29

Also being collected are bottle caps for the Campfire Girls and can tabs for Thrivent and cancelled postage stamps for an organization in Kent. Thank you for your donations!


MEMORIAL DAY PARADE
