St. Thomas Lutheran Church — Streetsboro, Ohio

Because Independence Day, July Fourth, kicks off the month, July is considered by some to be the most patriotic month. It certainly can be a time when we give some thought to what it means to be patriotic — the emotions, the behaviors, the sacrifices, the heritage that falls under the banner of patriotism.

This presents a certain dilemma for the Church (or at least for this Pastor in this church), since patriotism is not exactly a theological or religious category. I did a careful word search of the Bible; the terms "patriot" and "patriotism" appear nowhere. The term "citizenship" shows up twice: once when Paul asserts that he is Roman citizen at trial, thus assuring his fair treatment under Roman law; the other reference is Paul's assertion that we are citizens of heaven. Hardly seems to fit the theme of Independence Day.

There are places in the Bible where the role of a citizen is brought up. Paul writes, "... one must be subject [to authority], not only because of wrath but also because of conscience" [Romans 13:5], which emphasizes that we don't obey laws just because we might get punished, but because it's the right thing to do.

Peter also insists: "For the Lord's sake accept the authority of every human institution, whether of the emperor as supreme, or of governors, as sent by him to punish those who do wrong and to praise those who do right. For it is God's will that by doing right you should silence the ignorance of the foolish" [1 Peter 2:13-15]. Here also the emphasis is on doing God's will, not just observing human laws.

As Americans, we rather approve of Peter's next point, "As servants of God, live as free people," but we may not be so sure what to do with the rest of the passage: "yet do not use your freedom as a pretext for evil." What does he mean, and what would that look like for us? Then he tells us, "Honor everyone. Love the family of believers. Fear God." That we think we can do. But this last one? "Honor the emperor." where does that fit into our lives? Some may accuse our authorities of imperialism, but we do not have an emperor to honor. Will a mayor do?

It can all get rather confusing. Is it a Christian virtue to vote? A duty? Should a Christian seek public office, or shy away? One assumes it is a Christian value to obey the law. What if you morally or ethically disagree with the law? Do you follow the counsel to obey, or are you bound, in some manner, to protest? Should you work behind the scenes for change, or openly commit acts of civil disobedience? Throughout this nation's history, Christian citizens have struggled with these very questions (and it is hardly limited to this nation). Being a good Christian citizen is not simple.

One thing should be clear, however: Patriotism is no substitute for faith. The Christian's first allegiance is to Christ; all other loyalties must give way to that essential, life-giving relationship. If in any way the demands, requests, obligations, or duties to our country conflict with our unity with and in Christ, Christ has first priority — always!

Within the Christian community we may disagree about governmental policies, legislative actions, bureaucratic decisions, and basic political philosophies. We may virulently disagree with one another about candidates, platforms, and issues. One thing we must always agree on as citizens: our love for each other in Christ cannot be compromised by anything so petty as a political squabble.

Pray that pastors would be excited to be an integral part of their school's ministry and the teaching of the children. 5. for the ability of Lutheran schools to serve every child in their care. Ask that the Lord would provide the means to help schools serve children who have disabilities, who have experienced trauma or who come from families with limited resources. 6. for Lutheran schools that are struggling to fill empty seats. Pray that God would revitalize their ministries, energize their staff members and bring more children through their doors. 7. for parents who support our Lutheran schools with their time, talents and treasures. Give thanks for their dedication to the mission of the school. 8. for daily opportunities for our teachers and staff to show God's mercy, love and forgiveness both inside and outside of the classroom. Pray that God would maintain our ability to practice our faith in Lutheran schools. 9. for church members who tell the story of their Lutheran school, that their recommendation might lead more students through the school's doors. 10. for the many non-Christians and exchange students who are coming to our schools. Pray that God would work through the Gospel that they will have faith in Jesus. 11. for first-year teachers, that they may apply their gifts to demonstrate grace and mercy. Pray that God would give them strength and patience. 12. for our early childhood centers that introduce young families to the saving love of Jesus. Pray that they are a faithful witness to the littlest of God's children and their families. 13. for courageous Lutheran schools willing to take calculated risks that will result in significant rewards for students. Pray that they would find joy and contentment in the midst of life's changes. 22. that Lutheran college students would be bold witnesses to their faith in Jesus Christ, even when faced with pressure from peers and professors. 23. that young people would hunger for the certain truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and not be deceived by the halftruths and lies of Satan. 24. for the 800,000plus foreign students studying at American colleges and universities. Many come from countries where the Gospel is not freely preached. Pray that their time in the U.S. would provide the opportunity for them to learn about Jesus. 25. for the international students who came to faith while studying abroad. Ask the Lord to provide support so that they can continue to grow in their faith after they return home. 26. for busy college students, who are pulled in many directions with the demands of school, work, friends, family and other activities. Pray that they would make God a priority by setting aside time for worship, Bible study and Christian service. 27. for the development of campus-ministry programs at institutions of higher education around the world. 28. that God would bless and guide the work of all students involved in mission work and volunteer opportunities both at home and abroad. Pray that this time would be a blessing to them and others. 29, with thanksgiving for a new school year. Pray that students and campus-ministry workers would return refreshed and with renewed dedication. 30. for recent college graduates, that they would find gainful employment as well as a church home where they can learn about God's holy Word in all of its truth and purity. 31. for all students, that God would protect them and provide people to share with them the Word of God.
