We are in the Easter season. It used to be called the "post-Easter" season, but, instead of referring to the Fourth Sunday <u>after</u> Easter, we refer to the Fourth Sunday <u>OF</u> Easter. The change of prepositions reflects a change in perspective.

This season recalls the forty days after Jesus resurrection when He made repeated appearances to His followers. Please note that I did not use the word "disciples" in that sentence. St. Paul told the church at Corinth that the Risen Christ "appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me." (1 Corinthians 15:5-8) it was not just to the Twelve that Jesus showed Himself alive.

Those appearances demonstrate to us (as they did to the earliest followers) the reality of the resurrection. In instance after instance, Jesus showed His hands and side, ate food, was touched — all to show that He was not the figment of someone's imagination, nor an apparition, nor the result of wishful thinking — He was alive! He IS alive!

In His resurrection appearances, Jesus did something of which we should take particular notice; more than once "he opened their minds to understand the scriptures." (*Luke 24:45*). Our Lord did not reveal His victory over death just to "show off." He wanted His followers to understand why He had come, why He had died, and why He had risen. He wants that for us, as well.

Which is why this Easter Season is called the Easter Season. We now become the followers to whom Jesus shows Himself alive. We witness Him in the Word, we experience Him present in His Body and Blood given us in bread and wine. In our fellowship with one another, we become aware of how close he is to each of us as we experience Him in all of us.

He wants also to open the Scriptures to us so that we might understand who He is and what He is doing. Some of us might be inclined to think that we already know enough, and need no more. Not so. Perhaps now, even more than ever before, we need to learn and experience more about Jesus and His purposes.

The disciples spent three years experiencing daily teaching and modeling; their training was far more extensive than anything we might have gone through. Yet He needed to open their minds and give them understanding. I can only speak for me; I suspect that I am just as thick-headed as they (maybe more).

So this Easter season becomes a time not just of slowing down the pace and taking it easy. Easter is not "over for another year." Easter continues. Just as the earliest followers of Jesus experienced the joy of seeing Him, walking with Him, eating with Him, learning from Him, we also rejoice to be in His presence and come to a deeper and greater understanding of Him and His mission.

The weeks that follow Easter are not just "after" — they are "of." We are not on the backside of an event now over. We are in the middle of an event without ending. The celebration continues; the joy does not abate. Christ IS truly risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

While we do not schedule a special worship service, we should make note of the fact that May 21 is **The Feast of the Ascension**, the day that celebrates Christ's return to heaven. Sometimes referred to as "the forgotten feast day," this is an important event in the life of our Lord and of His Church. Jesus Himself said it: "... it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you." Give thanks to God that Jesus has ascended to the right hand of God and that the gift of the

Holy Spirit is at work among us. Pastor Just has included a sermon on the Ascension on our website.

do with that time?




May 31 — The Day of Pentecost

Prayer is an unnatural activity to us because it flies in the face of our self-reliance, our autonomy and beliefs about self-sufficiency. It is alien to our independent human nature.

Prayer is one of life's greatest phenomonems, in that it cannot be explained in natural terms because it is a supernatural event in our lives.

Whether we are just beginning to learn about prayer, or have prayed a long time, as we grow in prayer we discover that God:

- 1) actually wants to be in relationship with us;
- 2) convinces us that He has been waiting for us all along;
- 3) will listen to us as long as we want to talk'
- 4) we matter to Him and He cares deeply about us;
- 5) assures us that His power is available to us;
- 6) His presence is with us in any situation we face;
- 7) He is always only a breath away.

When we pray we always feel closer to God, secure in His love, a little less fearful, and more confident.

True prayer has a way of releasing the life of God in your Spirit, and of activating and liberating the ministry of the Holy Spirit in your life. It will make a qualitative difference in your relationship with God as you learn to talk with God through personal prayer.
