

Gentlemen, start your engines!" is the famous cry at the Indianapolis 500 auto race. With that command, the race begins and the speed is awesome. Early fall feels like that.

If you still have school-aged kids, this time of year feels *a lot* like that! In our culture, the end of summer becomes the beginning of a race — to make sure that everything is in place for the start of school. There are clothing purchases . . . seemingly endless supplies for school . . . arrangements for bus schedules, car pools, day care, after-school activities . . . and, of course: sports! Add to that this year the question of at-home distance learning or in-school contact learning.

Even if your children have long since left the system of elementary and secondary education, there is still a feeling of new beginnings. The promise of harvest for those with vegetable gardens means a busy time to gather in the produce that will be canned or frozen or stored away. This, in turn, leads to the process of bedding the garden down for the winter.

For those of us who never grew up on a farm, this all may seem a little remote. Since we live in an area where farming was the norm not all that long ago, there is a kind of residual feeling that early fall brings to hurry things along before the snow flies.

With the advent of new technologies and products, most of us no longer know what it's like to get out the storm windows for mounting (an arduous task from the past). Homes now are designed to free owners from having to invest time, energy, and money on the land-locked equivalent of "battening down the hatches." But the change of seasons still brings a sense of urgency to get those things done.

This becomes a metaphor for life.

We spend a lot of time and energy on things that seem to be getting us ready for other things. So much time is spent on these pursuits that we often miss out on the very things we spend so much effort to get to. "Hurry up and wait," was the cry of those caught up in Army life. Today, often for no apparent reason, the cry is simply, "Hurry!"

The word we need to hear in this hectic time is "Stop!"

Stop worrying, Stop scurrying. Stop pushing and shoving. Stop fretting. Stop kvetching (it's Yiddish, look it up). Stop thinking that everything has to be done . . . by you . . . today!

Once you have come to a "full and complete stop" examine what is so important that you have no time for prayer, for meditation, to read the Bible, for worship, for fellowship with other Christians. Really, in all the rush — what IS so important?

We would like to thank Diane Pencin, Robin Hoffman, Gilbert Ayers and Guy Jeanblanc for volunteering to be on the Call committee to help us search for a new pastor. Pastor Just will be retiring from his ministry with St. Thomas at the end of December.

There are many options to look at but the most important one is the financial one. Abundant Life will no longer be using our building as Pastor Nickerson has taken a position in Columbus. That will mean \$425 less the congregation will be receiving.

Some of the options are 1) Call a full time pastor,, 2) Call a seminary student, 3) Share a pastor with another congregation 4) possible interim pastor. The committee is recommending that a congregational assessment be done. It would help the committee have an idea of the strength and weaknesses of our congregation.
