St. Thomas Lutheran Church — Streetsboro, Ohio



A contemporary song by Henry Smith frames an important message for this season. Examine with me these three lines:

Give thanks with a grateful heart.
Give thanks to the Holy One.
Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son.

There is, first, the repeated invitation to "Give thanks." This should be part of our lives without any invitation or calling, since all of life and everything in life is a gift. What other response could we give? Sadly, we recognize that many have convinced themselves that what they have they deserve, and so thanks would be unnecessary, even foolish. We affirm that it is neither foolish nor needless, but an essential part of what life is all about.

"Give thanks with a grateful heart." Any four-year-old knows that when your maiden aunt gives you a gift (oh, let's say a packet of underwear) and your mother says to you, "What do you say?" the correct, indeed the only, answer is "Thank you." But is it said with "a grateful heart"? Rarely.

Thanks rendered begrudgingly is little thanks at all. To give thanks with a grateful heart requires that we reflect on what we have received and consider the value of what has been given. Less importance should be attached to monetary value than we are inclined to do; we should give ever greater weight to that which enables, sustains, and improves our relationships with God and others. We should also discover our grateful response to being enabled to help others in time of need.

"Give thanks to the Holy One." This should define our lives as Christians. Martin Luther wrote, "we cannot perform any greater or better work for God, nor can we render Him a nobler service than thanking Him" [Lectures on Genesis].

We first need to recognize that all we have — these gifts showered into our lives — are indeed from God. We may offer thanks to our spouse or children, to a friend or neighbor or family member, for the token gift that marks a birthday or holiday; but true thanks belongs ultimately to God. James reminds us: "Every generous act of giving, with every coming down from the Father of lights . . ." (1:17)

"Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son." Here we embrace the finest gift of all, and the source of our deepest gratitude. Luther again: "We have nothing to give in return except praise, glory, and gratitude for the unspeakable gift — as the apostle calls it (2 Cor. 9:15) — which through the Gospel God has shed on us abundantly (Titus 3:6)" Lectures on Genesis. Without question, the greatest reason we have for offering up thanks is the Gift of Jesus Christ. Our present and eternal well-being are completely dependent on who He is, what He did, and what He continues to do for and in us.

"Count your blessings," we often hear said. It is suggested that Thanksgiving Day is a day to do just that. I think that is true, but incomplete. We are not simply to count our blessings, but to use

them to God's glory. That is not confined to one day for giving thanks, but it is every day that we are called to live out that Gospel through which God has blessed us to be a blessing to others.

Texts: Isaiah 64:1-9; Psalm 80; I Corinthians 1:3-9; Mark 13:24-37


Jesus provides signs of the end, but these do not give us a timetable. His wise advise is to stay alert, and keep watching.

PASTORAL ACTS:

Burials:

Albert Korasin, born October 25, 1925 in Maple Heights, Ohio, died on September 21, 2020 in Berea, Ohio, and was provided a Christian burial on September 28, 2020, with interment at Crown Hill Mausoleum in Twinsburg, Ohio.

Eunice Haschak, born June 25, 1938 in Cleveland, Ohio, died October 14, 2020 in Macedonia, Ohio, was provided a Christian burial on October 16, 2020, with interment at All Saints Mausoleum in Northfield, Ohio.



We have made it something of a tradition to use the fifth Sunday of a month as an opportunity to support a ministry or project beyond our congregation. November 29th is a fifth Sunday and Council has designated Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry (LMM) of Greater Cleveland as the recipient of funds on this occasion. Pastor Just has served on the board of LMM since 1982, six terms as President, four terms as Treasurer, and now as Emeritus.

[From the LMM website]: Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry seeks that people who are oppressed, forgotten, and hurting be empowered, valued, and healed by our unwavering commitment to addressing chronic needs, enabling people to self-sufficiency, and advocating for system change. As a catalyst and convener for meaningful conversation,

LMM seeks to change the social, political, and religious conversation about justice from one of limitations to one of possibilities.

Focusing on Housing & Shelter, Workforce Development, and Health & Wellness Services, LMM creates innovative programs that serve with people who are homeless, youth who are at-risk, older adults who are vulnerable (Adult Guardianship services provide guardians for all indigents in Cuyahoga and Lorain counties), people impacted by the criminal justice system, and individuals with behavioral health needs.

In the last year, LMM served nearly 7,000 people and engaged approximately 3,500 volunteers. Central Kitchen produced 348,575 meals for area homeless shelters. A total of 17,064 guardianship hours were clocked, 16,457 residential nights were provided to adolescents placed at our youth shelter (the only shelter in Cuyahoga County), 782 mothers and their children received emergency shelter at the family overflow site, and 100% of Health & Wellness participants received mental health services, regardless of ability to pay. 97.5% of Chopping for Change participants remained out of the criminal justice system post-release.

We encourage all our members to bring a special offering on November 29 in support of LMM.


CHRISTMAS EVE


