Julius Caesar summed up his military achievements in three words, "Veni Vidi, Vici." ("I came I saw. I conquered.") The first word gives us the clue to what the season of Advent is about. Take the passive participle of the Latin word *venire*, (*ventus*), employ the prefix *ad*-, and you wind up with *adventus* — "came to" (as in "I came to see the new painting," not "I was out for a while and then I came to.")

That makes it seem as if the Advent season is only about what <u>happened</u>. It is not. The Advent season is about what happened, what is going to happen, and what is happening. In short, the Advent season is a microcosm of the Christian life.

Of course, our Christian life has its roots in what happened — the birth life, death, resurrection and ascension of our Lord. He is the focal point of all that it means to be Christian — He came! So Advent is a time when we get ready to celebrate that coming. We call it Christmas, an event that took place more than 2,000 years ago.

The One whose coming we celebrate has promised He will come again. We look forward with eager hope to that Second Coming, in which event all of human history will have it culmination. Some, of course, see that coming as something of a danger, a time when judgment will be rendered for sins committed. Those of us who know that forgiveness is the free gift of the incarnate Lord do not look forward with dread; we know that our sins have already been dealt with in His sacrifice for us. So Advent is a time for us to look forward in hope.

Okay, so things happened; things will happen. What's happenin'?

That is not just a remnant greeting from the 60's and 70's, it is a serious issue about what faith sees in the here and now. Our faith must be trifocal. We need to keep an eye on the past, for that is where the story — our story — has its origins and from which we glean its meaning. We must keep and eye on the future, because we await the fulfilment of Christ's promise; our hopes are pined to that future. We must keep a very clear eye on what is going on right now, in the present moment so that we can be attentive to what God is doing and how God wills us to respond. Advent is a time for us to position ourselves to be aware that God is active now.

The Holy Spirit is always at work in us. Through His means, he enlivens our faith, comforts our sorrows, empowers our witness, and joins us in fellowship with other Christians. All this is done so that we can embrace the past completely and enthusiastically, while at the same time we anticipate the future and what a glorious future it will be. It is the present that so often hits us hard. We need to be aware constantly that God is with us, no matter what is happening.

Illness, injuries, setback of all kinds, relationship troubles, disappointments, bad choices, foolish mistakes — all these keep flooding into our lives uninvited. They can knock us down and leave us confused . . . unless we are fully aware that God draws near to us in just such moments and brings His power to bear in our lives.

This has been called "the sacrament of the present moment," and while it does not fit our classical Lutheran definition of a sacrament, it comes very close. Just as we need to be in constant connection to Word and Sacrament — investing time reading God's Word, meditating on it, sharing it with others, remembering our baptisms daily, frequently partaking of Christ's Body and Blood — we need to pay attention to the present moment and look for what God is doing.

For Caesar it was "Veni Vidi. Vici." For us it is "Venit. Veniet. Venit — "He came. He will come. He is coming." We look for Him, and because He is gracious, He finds us.

The prophet Isaiah announces that the Spirit of God is on him (words echoed by Christ). True for us?




December 20 — Advent IV

December 27 — St. John, Apostle and Evangelist

Sermon: "The Light Has Shined"

Texts: Revelation 1:1-6; Psalm 116; 1 John 1:1-2;2; John 21:20-25

On Christmas Eve we will hold one service at 8:00 PM. Our service that evening will be a mixture of traditional and contemporary: many hymns and carols we love; the usual Advent wreath lighting and the passing of the candlelight; familiar readings; while some of the liturgy will be updated. Pastor Just's sermon will be "Neon Noels or Living Light?"

What will be different is the arrangements for worship.

Because we want to try to keep things as safe as possible, we will practice social distancing — this means that the pews will be set up to seat people with space between those who attend. This may mean that some people will need to be seated in the Fellowship Hall, where we will provide a full video lead to what is happening in the sanctuary. You will also have the option to stay in your car and tune into the service on radio station 96.9. The service will be broadcast on Facebook, so you can tune in on your computer, tablet, or smart phone at home. We will offer communion in the style that we have been using for the past several months, using the prepared elements that will be handed out as you enter into worship.



December 27 will be Pastor Just's last service as our called Pastor. He will be retiring on December 31. It is more than likely that we will call on him for pulpit supply over the next several months, but we will be looking to make use of other area pastors, as well. He will be sort of among us for several more weeks as he works to empty out the files and other accumulated materials from 45+ years of ministry, so don't be surprised if you find him in the building through January.

BENEVOLENCE

For many years, council pledged \$1,000/year to support the work of the synod. The synod uses the pledge amount from all congregations for part of its budget. Offerings designated for Benevolence, as indicated on our offering envelopes, go towards this pledged amount. If at the end of the year the offerings for Benevolence are less than the pledge, then the shortfall is made up from our general fund. If benevolence offerings exceed the \$1,000 pledged, then all of it is sent. Other offerings also go the synod, such as mission and 1+1+1, but these are for those specific programs and not counted towards the pledge. Please note that a check is sent to the synod on a regular basis as offerings are received and not one check at the end of the year.

Also on the budget that will be discussed at the congregational meeting will see a raise of 3.9%. If you can possibly help us out by raising your tithe amount by at least \$5.00 it would really help. Thank you!
