For freedom Christ has set you free," St. Paul wrote to the Galatians. "You will know the truth and the truth will set you free," Jesus promised His disciples. It would appear that freedom is something of a big deal in our Christian faith.

Americans seem to have a vested interest in freedom — at least we talk a lot about it when our national holiday, Independence Day, pops up on the calendar. It appears to me that Paul and Jesus are talking about something different than what we so gloriously hail as we wave our flags and watch the fireworks: the freedom (make that freedoms) accorded us in such documents as the Declaration of Independence and Constitution of the United States.

Most of what our documents talk about are <u>rights</u>, not freedoms. Rights are not free, as we admit every Memorial Day when we recall the very steep price many have paid so that these rights may remain intact. Rights are protected by laws, and our system is designed to ensure that laws apply equally to all the rights of all the citizens (do we get it right all this time? No, but that is the intent).

The Scriptures are addressing true freedom. Sin enslaves us. The Law holds us captive. The devil would rob us of our freedom. It is against such slavery that Jesus and Paul declare freedom.

Jesus was especially focused on the freedom that is based on truth: the truth that God wants us to have everything He designed for us in His creative actions. Our sinfulness, to which we are in bondage and which has distorted God's creation and our enjoyment of it, is grounded in the Big Lie — the one Satan used to entice Eve: "You don't need God. You can BE God."

Jesus came to announce the Good News that God and God alone can release us from this bondage, and did so in the death and resurrection of Jesus. That is the freeing truth Jesus both declared and accomplished.

Paul had a different tack. He knew that we sinners would constantly try to earn God's favor (or at least escape any punishment) — because that is what "religion" has always encouraged humans to do! "Keep your nose clean, and God will like you." Paul would like to know why we allow ourselves repeatedly to get sucked into that way of thinking.

Because the Good News has always been that God has never held any assessment of us other than that He loves us. The entire message of the Bible — Old and New Testaments — is the narrative of God reaching out to win back the human creatures who had rebelled against Him, attempted to replace Him, and walked off in pursuit of their own agendas.

That rebellion was made possible by the capacity God created within us to choose freely how to respond to Him. We call this "free will" and it was truly free. God did not dictate what we must do; He always has provided for our ability to choose what we choose to choose.

But with choices come consequences. When Adam and Eve chose selfishly, they faced consequences — expulsion from the Garden of Eden, hard toil, labor pains.

Our choices result in consequences, as well. We are free to choose whatever we wanted to eat, drink, ingest, digest, taste, experience, and enjoy. Those choices result in consequences we may rather not face; but, as one pundit said, "You cannot sow wild oats and then pray for crop failure."

Within the range of free choices we may make, God presents us always with a "best" — the choice that will lead us to, and keep us on, the path to Him. We may choose otherwise, indeed we may choose the "worst"... at which point God always lays before us a new "best" that can get us back on track. What we freely choose will be conditioned by what we allow to influence us. If the world, our own desires, our greed, our lust for power (or just plain lust), the designs of the evil one, apathy, boredom (I can go on ad nauseam) — if that is what we allow to guide our life choices, we will find it very difficult to get where God wants us to be. If we center in on Jesus, what He taught us and modeled for us, our choosing will be much better aligned with God's desires for us.

Either way, we are free to choose — and deal with the consequences. We should know that one of those consequences will never be that God forsakes us, gives up on us, or wills to do us harm. No matter how foolish, wayward, unhelpful, uninformed, or selfish our choices, in Christ we are assured of God's love.

That is the core truth that sets us free.

Texts: 2 Kings 4:42-44; Psalm 145; Ephesians 3:14-21; John 6:1-21


In the miraculous feeding of 5,000, Jesus shows us how only He satisfies all our hungers.


