The opening chapters of Genesis make it plain that God took particular care to fashion the creatures that would be known as "humans." In Hebrew, the word is *yatzar*, and it means to form or shape. Moreover, the Bible tells us that God did this "in His image" (Gen.2:7). What this means is that the human creatures were <u>formed</u> into a special and intimate relationship with God, knew His will, agreed with it, and longed for nothing more than to be what God intended them to be.

It did not take very long before that ideal situation was disturbed. When Satan entered the scene, convinced Eve that God was holding something back from her by forbidding the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, bringing her to think that she (and later with her, Adam) could exist without or apart from God, something happened to that divine image — it was deformed. Intimacy with God was shattered, replaced by distrust and fear. It was not longer God's will that mattered, but their own desires and priorities. Cast out from the garden, they were left to struggle in a world that would resist them, plague them, and bring them frustration and injury.

But God was not content to leave it at that. In the person of Jesus Christ, He gave us a "second Adam"—like the first, formed in God's image, fully aware of and living to God's will, who would lead a life that showed what it meant to be what God intended us to be. When He was crucified, Jesus' death became the substitute for our own deaths. As one author has expressed it: "Jesus lived that life that we are supposed to, but cannot, and died that death that we deserved, but now need not." (Harry Wendt). The proof of this is Jesus' resurrection. When we are joined to that death and resurrection in the waters of Baptism, we are reformed into the relationship God has always desired to have with us.

We come to know this because Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to provide the means by which we could become <u>informed</u> of what had been accomplished for our salvation. Christ has done everything necessary for our salvation; we can add nothing to it, nor detract from it. We are given the Word and Sacraments to <u>reform</u> us anew into image of God, a condition we are given when we simply trust what God has done.

Over the centuries, people have attempted to add to what God has done, insisting that we must somehow be responsible for our own redemption. Some have labeled this "Jesus-plus theology." It has a long history, and it was this problem to which God brought the insights and passions of Martin Luther and other reformers to address. In his theology, Luther sought to bring the Church back to the position that grace alone, and our trust in that grace, is what saves — not what we do. We have been given that heritage to embrace and celebrate.

The Spirit would take us a step further. That faith which trusts what God has done should also be doing something in us. St. Paul invites us to be <u>transformed</u> (Rom. 12:2). We are to be different people — different from what we would be had we not been joined to Christ, and different from the world around us. We are to be drawn into greater devotion to God, deeper awareness of the Spirit's presence, more intense desire to serve and love in Christ's name. We are to do odd things,

like pray for enemies, do good to those we would rather not even be around, forgive, and (most difficult of all) deny ourselves.

Formed, deformed, reformed (many times), informed, and transformed — this is our Christian journey. As the hymn reminds us, our "walk is heavenward all the way" (The Lutheran Hymnal 413).




October 3 — Pentecost XIX

Blind Bartimaeus had his sight restored; but something even greater was restored as well.




October 31 — Reformation Day

Members of our Church Council and Call Committee have met twice with representatives from Christ Lutheran Church in Mantua to discuss the possibility of sharing a pastor. The conversation will continue on Octob er 14 as we shape together our separate and shared expectations of how one pastor may serve both congregations. St. Thomas has the experience with Pastor Just and the agreement with Epiphany Lutheran in Northfield. Christ Lutheran had been served for many years by one pastor, Rev. Douglas Riley, and is presently served by Rev. Dan Esala as Interim.

Issues of finances, shared time, worship schedules, office time, and scores of other details will need to be considered and settled. There is also the issue that St. Thomas is part of the English District; Christ Lutheran is part of the Ohio District. None of these issues are roadblocks, but they will require attention. Keep our Call Committee and Church Council in prayer as they continue discussions with the Church Council and Call Committee at Christ Lutheran.



The Cleveland-Akron Circuits of the English District have agreed to study and implement the idea of serving as sponsors for Afghan Refugees. Pastors from the Ohio District Akron-Youngstown Circuits have indicated interest, as well. News reports indicate that several hundred such refugees will be coming to Northeast Ohio

after the vetting process that leads to Special Immigrant Visas (SIV). Pastor Just has been in contact with Lutheran Immigration and Refugees Services (LIRS) and is expecting more detailed information about how such sponsorships will be handled at what cost. As that information is made known, there will be a need for volunteers to help with planning, searching, finding, and gathering such things as: clothing, shelter, furniture, food, supplies, education opportunities, and the like. We have no idea about any of this right now; we need to proceed on faith. You can go to the LIRS website https://www.lirs.org/help-our-afghan-allies/ to learn more. Pray earnestly that we be available if the Lord calls on us to help in this way.
