

It is customary in November to focus attention on Thanksgiving Day, and on our need to be, or be more, thankful for all that we have. That is certainly a good idea — to be thankful. But November has two other days of festivity that we ought to keep in focus: All Saints Day and Christ the King.

All Saints Day (which falls on November 1, and is observed in worship on November 7), marks the day when we think about that interesting concept, The Invisible Church. We spend our lives looking at The Visible Church, and a portion of those lives looking at the one segment of The Visible Church we know as St. Thomas Lutheran Church. For one Sunday, we consider that we are connected to all the saints of all of history and of all the future. We remember those whom

we have known personally by observing Totentag (A Remembrance of the Faithfully Departed); we reflect on the witness of those unknown to us.

The concept of The Invisible Church conveys to us two ideas. First is the notion that most Christians live out lives of faith in obscurity. They are invisible to the lens of history. Most of us are numbered among those Christians. Faithful followers of Christ whose names are known to Him and relatively few others. Few of us become as well-known as Martin Luther or Mother Theresa. Second is the notion that any person's faith is invisible to others. The Invisible Church carries the idea that, seated within the gathered congregation, there are people whose faith is obvious and people whose faith has not yet blossomed.

Both Visible and Invisible Church gather in the presence of Christ the King (the day is celebrated on November 21). Some may tend to think of Christ's Kingship only on Palm Sunday, when the crowds hailed Him as king, or Ascension Day, when He assumes His throne on high. But the Biblical witness tells us that we are to see, recognize, and honor Christ as King always. To be a Christian is to hail Jesus as King.

We more frequently use the term "Lord." Both titles bring us to the same posture — on our knees. It is the posture of saints. Saints kneel before their Lord and King because they know His authority over them. Saints kneel to emulate their Lord and King as they serve others in the way that He served others.

All Saints Day and Christ the King go together. We rejoice to celebrate both this month. We rejoice to be numbered among God's saints, His chosen and redeemed. We rejoice to serve so glorious a Servant King.

Then November 28 brings the First Sunday of Advent.

It's a busy month.

### November 28 — Advent I


Sermon: "The Days Are Coming"

On December 5, we will hold our Annual Congregational Meeting after our worship service. All members are encouraged to join us. Along with the usual items like the budget, the Church Council will bring a proposal regarding membership. For the past several months, Diane Lee and Robin Hoffman have been combing through to update Congregational Meeting the Parish Register and identified a number of names that appear to no longer meet the terms of membership that are in the by-laws. That list

of names will be made available the week before the meeting so that you can take it home to review and help us make proper decisions about these memberships. We ask you to pray about how we can best handle what can be a delicate decision.



As you have read or heard from news reports, a large number of Afghani refugees have fled their native land due to the resurgence of the Taliban. I have been in contact with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (LIRS) and learned that they will be helping with the effort at resettlement. I am awaiting further information on how, when, and where that will be taking place. Several congregations from the English and Ohio Districts in the Greater Cleveland-Akron area have indicated willingness to join the effort. In addition, a possible source for grant money to assist such an undertaking has emerged, and I just learned that Lutheran Heritage Foundation has recently

published (and will be sending me) materials in Dari and Farsi, the two languages spoken in Afghanistan. This is all sounding to me very much like "a God thing" to which we should give due attention. I hope to have more detailed information to share in the very near future.



Our Search Committee has been meeting with the Call Committee from Christ Lutheran in Mantua to discuss calling and sharing a pastor. They have invited St. Thomas members to join them on November 6 at 2:00 PM for an Ice Cream Social. Christ Lutheran is located just north of "downtown" on Main Street (Route 44) in Mantua. While our meetings are not designed to merge our congregations, it would likely be beneficial for members of both churches to get to know one another; this is a beginning. Join in!
