

# GROWING MISSIONALLY

There's a "buzz word" that has gained popularity in some segments of the Church — "missional." It first appeared on my horizon when I went to the ChristCare training in St. Louis. One of the "pillars" of the ChristCare program is "missional service." [When we began the ChristCare ministry at Epiphany in Northfield, we decided that the phrase "self-giving service" would be better understood.]

Since then, I keep running into this word "missional." In January, the entire Winter issue of

Leadership magazine was devoted to "Going Missional," with article after article devoted to what it means for a congregation to become "missional." It is as if the entire evangelical arm of the church woke up one morning and discovered that the Church indeed has a mission to which we ought to give attention.

The word "missional" is new (indeed, I have repeatedly now placed it within quotation marks because my computer's spell-check keeps informing me that this is not a word). The concept, however, in anything but new. In our Lutheran circles, we grew accustomed to using the term "mission-minded." That phrase suggested a congregation, its budget, and its work plan had an eye on supporting what we have classically referred to a "mission work" — and that has usually meant sending workers to foreign lands to bring the Gospel to people who had never been exposed to the Gospel.

"Missional" is now used to describe something more all-encompassing. It does not refer solely to foreign or overseas mission work, and to sending others to do that work, but to shaping within a congregation a vision for how Christ can use all His people in any locale to bring those who do not know Christ into His presence to be touched by His love. Being "missional" means being attuned to the needs and opportunities for service and witness that exist wherever God's people may be. There's another term that has come alongside "missional" — "glocal." It tells us that our vision can never be limited to a single locale, but must be open to seeing opportunities both near and far.

I believe that St. Thomas can claim to be a "missional" (and hereafter I will drop the quotation marks) congregation. Our support for many ministries of caring is testimony to that designation: our help to Redeemer Crisis Center (itself a missional ministry), our ongoing work with the local food pantry; support for Akron Pregnancy Services, our fifth-Sunday offerings, our support for the work of the Naumann's in Latin and South America — all of these point to a congregation that has a missional bent.

But we have not yet become a glocal congregation. We need to encourage within one another a broader scope of vision of how our congregation can shape the world. John Wesley declared that

"the whole world is my parish;" it is a sentiment we could well adopt. Added to this month's newsletter (and I am planning for it to continue each month) is a "Pray for Us" calendar from the Synod, offering areas of concern that can help focus our attention beyond of congregation's boundaries.

Growing missionally is a key. Being satisfied is hardly ever a missional attitude; being discontented with the status quo is a more positive sign of missional thinking — because usually the status quo means that someone's needs are going unmet. As St. Thomas is moving ahead with the call process, we need to think beyond "our community" — or better, to redefine "our community" as the global community. We must strive to continue to grow as a missional church with a glocal vision. Please join in prayer for God's guidance and strength to do this.

Shakespeare's play explores issues of justice and mercy, and the lack thereof. How does God deal with those matters?




## February 27 — The Transfiguration of Our Lord

Volunteers traditionally serve 2-3 hours a week or as on-call support a few days a month. Volunteers do not have direct contact with patients in contact precautions (such as COVID). #### WOULDN'T IT BE...


