

We are in the Easter season. It used to be called the "post-Easter" season, but, instead of referring to the Fourth Sunday <u>after</u> Easter, we now refer to the Fourth Sunday <u>OF</u> Easter. The change of prepositions reflects a change in perspective.

This season recalls the forty days after Jesus' resurrection when he made repeated appearances to his followers. Please note that I did not use the word "disciples" in that sentence. St. Paul told the church at Corinth that the Risen Christ "appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the

apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me" [1 Corinthians 15:5-8]. It was not just to the Twelve that Jesus showed Himself alive.

Those appearances demonstrate to us (as they did to the earliest followers) the reality of the resurrection. In instance after instance, Jesus showed His hands and side, ate food, was touched — all to show that he was not the figment of someone's imagination, nor an apparition, nor the result of wishful thinking — He was alive! He IS alive!

In His resurrection appearances, Jesus did something of which we should take particular notice; more than once "he opened their minds to understand the scriptures" [Luke 24:45]. Our Lord did not reveal His victory over death just to "show off." He wanted his followers to understand why he had come, why he had died, and why he had risen.

He wants that for us, as well.

Which is why this Easter Season is called the Easter Season. We now become the followers to whom Jesus shows himself alive. We witness him in the Word, we experience him present in his Body and Blood given us in bread and wine. In our fellowship with one another, we become aware of how close he is to each of us as we experience him in all of us.

He wants also to open the Scriptures to us so that we might understand who he is and what he is doing.

Some of us might be inclined to think that we already know enough, perhaps even more than we need to know about Jesus and his purposes. The disciples spent three years experiencing daily teaching and modeling; their training was far more extensive than anything we might have gone through. Yet He needed to open their minds and give them understanding. I can speak only for me; I suspect that I am just as thick-headed as they (maybe more).

So this Easter season becomes a time not just of slowing down the pace and taking it easy. Easter is not "over for another year." Easter continues. Just as the earliest followers of Jesus experienced the joy of seeing him, walking with him, eating with him, learning from him, we also rejoice to be in his presence and come to a deeper and greater understanding of him and his mission.

The weeks that follow Easter are not just "after" — they are "of." We are not on the backside of an event now over. We are in the middle of an event without ending. The celebration continues; the joy does not abate. Christ IS truly risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia!

Lydia opened her home to St. Paul and his companions, which opened the door to mission work throughout Greece. What invitation can you offer?




May 29 — Easter VII

For the gala event, there will be an silent auction online. If you can think of a gift or service that you can provide for that auction — tickets to some event, a craft item you can handmake, a work of art, for example — you are invited to contact Todd Brady, a member of Prince of Peace, Medina OH, or let Pastor Just know, and he'll get Todd to contact you.

Between the auction sales and donations, the goal the gala event is to raise \$50,000 to support District missions.

Of the many ministries supported by the English District, two warrant our attention. On Easter Sunday you received a newsletter from Pastor Jonathan and Deaconess Cheryl Naumann about their work in Latin America. In this newsletter you will see copy of the latest report from Redeemer Crisis Center in Cleveland. Both these ministries are part of our congregation's engagement with witnessing beyond our church's four walls. Please keep them in prayer.



When there is a fifth Sunday in a month, we use the opportunity to receive a special offering to support a local ministry. On May 29, we will ask you to support Akron Pregnancy Services (APS), a ministry that offers accurate information, practical support, and the love of Christ to those in

unplanned prégnancies. On May 14, we invite you to join Robin Hoffman as she participates in the Walk for Life. She will be walking her neighborhood (or maybe the church parking lot) and is seeking both sponsors and fellow-walkers who will find yet other sponsors. Talk to Robin about joining her (you'll know her by the APS T-shirt she'll be wearing).



Our Call Committee reported to the Church Council on April 24 that they and the Call Committee at Christ, Mantua had narrowed down to four the number of potential pastors to be interviewed. They then learned that one of those pastors had recently accepted a Call, and was therefore no longer eligible for this Call; BUT, there was yet another name to consider, to that name was added to the list. This month, they will be in the process

of setting up virtual interviews with all four candidates, which will give the Call Committees opportunity to ask more questions to each candidate, and give the candidates opportunity to ask questions back. So sometime in the near future (however that may be defined), we may need to hold a Special Congregation Meeting, when the Call Committee is ready to make a recommendation, to extend a Call. As this process moves along, continue in prayer for our Call Committee: Gilbert Ayers, Robin Hoffman, Guy Jeanblanc, and Diane Pensin.



On June 5, which is also Pentecost Sunday (so plan to wear red), St. Thomas will celebrate its 60th anniversary as a congregation. Plans are still being made, so we will update you as we know the full story, but we urge you now to place that date on your calendar to join us in worship followed by a celebration event (which will likely involve something like a potluck dinner; watch for details). We will also welcome any volunteers who are willing to help with the planning, set-up, tear-down, etc. of our celebration event.



The English District will meet in Convention June 20 to 22 at Concordia University in Ann Arbor, Michigan. Our Lay Delegate will be Robin Hoffman; Pastor Just will be our Pastoral Delegate (unless there is a new Pastor by




With the help of several dedicated volunteers, we have managed to revise our setting and format and still serve our families with food, toiletries, paper products and cleaning supplies!

For those who know the inside of our building, the multipurpose room near the kitchen has become a huge supply room of food bags and other items. People check in outside the back door and their supply bags are brought up the stairs and out to them at the door.

Several racks of clothing and miscellaneous items are displayed on the front church stairs where people, a few at a time, can select items that they need.

The old clothing room in combination with the old check-in room next door is used for extra storage and some office space. The back room on the other side of the gate has refrigerators and freezers holding meats and other frozen items. There continues to be a well-organized dry food packing room across the hall, but no household goods room.





Babies' Care and Fun with Books moved to the outdoors. Canopies and tables were spread throughout the backyard where presenters shared their information with those attending the sessions.

The children spend time listening, reading and interacting with an adult and books. They love listening to

(or reading out loud themselves) stories and doing related activities.

This new outdoor plan has worked well and makes connections with neighbors and passers-by and allows us to keep everyone safer. Adults move from table to table to gather information or needed items such as diapers, clothing or baby/small child items.

The gym upstairs has become a storage room for clothing and some small goods items. New, safe shelving has been installed to make it easier to locate and obtain other needed items. And, the main floor of the church on the same level as the gym area is used for storage of donated items and some meeting space.

We are hoping to offer an outdoors Vacation Bible School (VBS) this summer one day a week on Thursdays during July under canopies in our back yard using some of the same display and activity formats as Babies' Care and Fun with Books which worked so well. So, we have a need for adult and teen volunteers to help with VBS as well as to volunteer packing bags or hanging clothing or organizing items. Contact Diane if you, a youth or a group of youth are willing to help.

We could also use your help with our main outdoor projects this spring and summer. First we will repair/replace the 20+ year fencing going around the back yard, add picnic tables to the area and install a new playground. We would welcome donations toward this project and volunteers to help with the work. This would make a great Thrivent Action Team Grant Project.

We will also be collecting backpacks and school supplies for distribution in August. We can use help obtaining materials and helping on distribution day: This would be another great Thrivent Action Team Grant Project. Contact Diane for information: 216-631-6434.


