October 2022

Each year in October, either on the last Sunday or on the 31st, Lutherans celebrate Reformation Day. Historically, that day marks the date for Luther's posting of his 95 Theses — academic propositions on which he desired some debate. These were reprinted and published all over Germany, indeed throughout the Holy Roman Empire. They set off a firestorm of discussion and calls for change in the Church. From that simple act of posting a notice began what would be known as The Reformation.

Many people have made the observation that the Church is in need of constant reformation. As an institution, I tend to agree — at least we ought to pay very close attention to what we do, say, and believe and adjust whatever does not match God's Word. This was the reform Luther sought; it is what those who follow his teaching ought to demand.

Such reformation does not work so well in individuals. For us, the need is not so much reformation as it is formation and transformation.

Spiritual formation can be defined as "the process of forming the inner human world so that it takes on the character of the inner being of Christ himself." [Dallas Willard in <u>The Great Omission.</u>] This involves such spiritual disciplines as fasting, prayer, meditation, service, chanting, and many others. Such formation is work — effort we undertake with the empowering of the Holy Spirit. We are invited in the scriptures to "be conformed to Christ." When we commit to do this, we begin the work of spiritual formation.

It is truly a life's work. Such disciplines cannot be dabbled in; we must commit ourselves to lifelong task of being formed into the likeness of Christ. We commit to the work; the Holy Spirit does the forming. The Christian community is of great help in this process, especially if we gather a close circle of friends to work with and encourage one another. But spiritual formation cannot really begin until spiritual transformation has taken place. Transformation is not incremental change; it is wholesale renovation. We are transformed when Christ fills us with His healing and empowering presence.

Many of us (perhaps even most of us) "grew up in the faith." By this we mean that we cannot identify a time when we realized that Christ was not part of our lives. Baptized as infants, raised in Christian homes, nurtured in Sunday School and Confirmation Class (maybe even parochial school), we would say that we have "always" been Christians. This is true: our Baptisms did great things in our lives, including joining us to Christ [see Romans 6].

Yet, something seems to be missing for many of us — some energy, some direction, some excitement. What we need is the transforming power to become more concrete. We have it; it is the gift of our Baptism — but many of us have buried it under layers of performance, hurts, doubts, and grief. Jesus bids us come to Him, yet we try to keep Him at arm's length. We have faith; but our faith-life seems hollow, or shallow, and maybe even dead. Now we hear His call once again; we are invited to lean into Him and find the true join of letting go and releasing ourselves into His love.

Institutions can be reformed, and we give thanks for God raising up such people as Martin Luther to reform His Church. We, in turn, must be spiritually formed into the image of Christ (Himself the perfect image of God) and spiritually transformed by the healing power and presence of Christ in us. In this season of The Reformation, let us pray for one another that we might each experience such formation and transformation.

Jesus heals ten lepers, made them clean. He tells the one who came back that faith made him well. See the difference?




October 16— Pentecost XIX

October 30 — Reformation Sunday

Sermon: "Freeing Truth"

Texts: Jeremiah 31:31-34; Psalm 46; Romans 3:19-28; John 8:31-36

Jesus proclaims that the truth shall set us free. What truth? Free to do what?

Synod's Constitution calls for a three-year cycle of governance: Year One is when each District meets in convention; Year Three is when the Synodical Convention is held. Year Two calls for each Circuit to meet for a Circuit Forum, which is intended to be a time for learning, planning possible missions, and for electing Pastoral and Lay Delegates (plus alternates) to the Synodical Convention. Our Circuit's Forum will be held on Saturday, October 1 at Ascension Lutheran Church in North Olmsted, from 10:00 AM to 1:00 PM. The Guest Speaker for the event will be Kate Makra, Executive Director for Cleveland Right to Life. Pastor Just and our Lay Delegate to the District Convention, Robin Hoffman, will attend; if you would like to take part, let Pastor Just know of your interest and we will arrange for transportation.



SEARCH COMMITTEE

On September 4, we held a Special Congregation Meeting to discuss and vote on extending a Call for e new Pastor. A quorum was in place, the name of Rev. Steven Latzke was presented with the recommendation of the Call Search Committee, and a positive vote taken to extend that Call. Since this is to be a joint Call with Christ Lutheran in Mantua, we awaited their holding a Voters Assembly on September 13 for the same purpose. That

meeting brought the same result. At the time of this newsletter edition, meetings were still being planned to work with our Circuit Visitor, Rev. Jonathan McCall to get through the paperwork involved in this process. Since it is not just the two congregations, but also two Districts involved (English and Ohio), it gets a bit more convoluted. Pastor Latzke has been advised of the results of the two Call meetings, and has said that he will give it "prayerful consideration." It would be well if we all did the same.



We held a planning session on August 21 to conduct what is called a SWOT Analysis. SWOT stands for Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats. The process for the session was to invite participants to write a response (or more than one) on a post-it sheet for each of those categories and place those on four separate poster

boards. This followed by discussion and refining of what had been written. Those poster boards remain in the Church Office; we encourage you to take a look to see the results. The idea behind this brief exercise was to identify some areas we can build on, some where we might need to change course, some that may open up possibilities, and some that we need to give attention because they may bring a negative impact. This was done in the expectation that, when St. Thomas does welcome a new Pastor, we can share some sense of looking to the future together.
