

We begin the month of November with the celebration of All Saints Day (and All Saints Sunday). We end the month as we celebrate Christ the King. Many saints; one King.

On the church calendar there are days of commemoration and there are feast days.

Days of commemoration indicate that we give proper attention to the importance of an individual or an event in the history of the church. For instance, on November 30, we will commemorate the day of St. Andrew, Apostle, honoring one of the disciples that walked with

Jesus, and perhaps taking some time to learn more about him and how his life might help inform our Christian journey [check out his information at Wikkipedia] As we commemorate, we learn, we may be inspired, we can grow.

Feast days are to be celebrated. The concept of naming a date on the calendar as a "feast day" implies that there will be some food upon which to feast. In the Church, this almost always means the meal provided by our Lord Himself: the Holy Eucharist. That meal is always "a foretaste of the feast to come," the eternal banquet we will share in heaven. That image also implies that, on feast days, we should find reasons to become exuberant in our praise, our fellowship, and our witness. Both All Saints and Christ the King are feast days.

All Saints Day brings us the joyous reminder that, because of Christ's sacrifice on the cross and His glorious resurrection, nothing of our sins is counted against us. We are declared by God to be "holy" — in Latin, that word is *sanctus*, from which we get the word "saint." All of God's people are thus saints, because all of God's people have been declared holy and righteous before God.

St. Andrew gets the word "saint" capitalized before his name because he is mentioned in the Bible. While many people throughout history have been designated with this title (in the Roman Catholic Church, this is accomplished through the process known as canonization), in Lutheran circles, we are inclined to honor only those whose names are clearly drawn from the Word of God. Yet, we all *could* adopt that title for ourselves, because God has made us into something we could never have accomplished on our own, by our deeds, or through our merits. That's a very good reason to celebrate.

But, lest we get carried away with ourselves (for Luther taught us that we are *simul justus et peccator*—at the same time sinners and saints, and we always need to be on guard that the sinner not take over), Christ the King Sunday reminds us that there is only one King (and neither you nor I get that title)! We celebrate that there is just the one king because, if we all were vying for the title (which our sinful selves would be inclined to do), we'd mess up kingship completely.

The kingship of Christ is an important message for our faith. We are inclined to divide our thinking between religious and secular realms. Thus, we are inclined to think that our religious fealty

operates solely on Sundays and our secular obligations run the other six days. When we say that Jesus Christ is King, we are saying that we owe Him our allegiance all the time and in all places. Yes, there is a secular authority that is over us (we call it government; Luther called it "the kingdom of the left hand"), but it is under the kingship of Christ. All of life is under the kingship of Christ. So every waking moment His saints seek (as Luther wrote) to "live under Him in His kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness..."


Our Worship This Month



November 3 — All Saints Sunday

Sermon: "What Does It Mean to Be 'Holy'?"

Texts: Daniel 7:1-8,15-18; Psalm 149; Ephesians 1:11-23; Luke 6:20-31 The word "saint" comes from the Latin "sanctus" which means "holy." We explore what that means for our walk of faith.



November 13 — Pentecost XXIII

Sermon: "Do We Know What's Coming?"

Texts: Malachi 4:1-6; Psalm 98; 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13; Luke 21:5-19 Jesus teaches His fol-lowers what to look for as the end times approach. Do we know what to look for?



November 20 — Christ the King

Sermon: "Save Us From Our Crosses"

Texts: Jeremiah 23:1-6; Psalm 95; Colossians 1:11-20; Luke 23:33-43 The thief on the cross cries out to be rescued. We often cry out to be spared pain or sorrow.



November 27 — Advent I

Sermon: "You Know What Time It Is"

Texts: Isaiah 2:1-5; Psalm 122; Romans 13:11-14; Matthew 24:36-44

St. Paul tells the Christians at Rome that they know what time it is. How did they know? How do we?



We remind you to turn back your clocks before you retire on Saturday, November 5 since at 2:00 AM on November 6 Daylight Savings Time comes to an end (and you don't want to arrive for church at the wrong time!)

On December 1 we begin Midweek Advent Services. This season we will focus on the theme: Be Born in Us Today, reminded that Christ is born in us spiritually today and every day. He enters into us daily to strengthen and support us, save us, and renew us. Soup suppers begin at 6:30 PM; our worship begins at 7:30 PM. Please join us. If you wish to volunteer to bring a soup, salad, bread, or dessert, a sign-up sheet will be on the narthex bulletin board.



December 1 Be Born in Us Today Bringing Blessing

In Genesis 12:2, God promises Abraham that an offspring from his line would bring blessing to all. When Jesus was born, that promise came true with an abundance.



December 8 Be Born in Us Today Bringing Renewal

The prophet Isaiah declared (40:31) that a Holy One would be born into this world to bring renewal to all the faint and weary. Christ's birth restores our strength that we might serve him.



December 15 Be Born in Us Today Bringing Guidance

In Psalm 31:3, the children of Israel are reminded that they wandered in the wilderness for 40 years, often doubting God's plan for them. With the arrival of Jesus on the scene, we have a clear path to the promised land of heaven through him who is The Way.



December 22 Be Born in Us Today Bringing Power

Reflecting Exodus 15:6, John the Baptist pointed to the power of God present in Jesus Christ. As we prepare for the birth of Baby Jesus, we point others to the power at work in our lives through our Emmanuel, God with Us.
