Christmas is about one thing

Christmas is a confusing season. There are so many images that blend the secular with the spiritual that even Christians sometimes can't sort through them all. Imagine what it must be like for unbelievers.

There was a campaign that ran on some radio stations encouraging people to say "Christmas." Not a bad idea (I never stopped, but evidently some people have pushed political correctness to its usual extreme), but the ads seem to think that it's not such a good idea to focus on Father Winter and to think about Santa instead. Did I mention that these radio stations play Christian music? Not a single mention of Jesus (that I've heard).

Elves and shepherds, wise men and reindeer, wrapped packages and six-packs, shining stars and shiny jewelry, greeting cards and angel voices, lighted trees and well-lit celebrants — they all seem to blend in the American version of Christmas.

You hear things like: "Christmas is about family." "Christmas is about helping the poor." "Christmas is for dreaming." Can we ever sort through this hodgepodge of icons to reclaim what Christmas should mean? It's hard.

Christmas is about one thing — it is about a God who loves us humans so much that He could not bear the idea that we should wander away from Him into nothingness. He had sent messenger after messenger to announce to us His will and purpose, His displeasure, His hopes for us, His love for us — but we ignored them.

So He finally decided there only one thing left to do — become one of us; become, not just *like* us, but actually become one of us (being omnipotent, He could do this; we've longed for some time to do the opposite, that is: be God . . . fortunately, we cannot). But He did not become one of us in power — He did not descend in regal majesty or awesome display of glory. He came in weakness, as a child . . . a child who would have to grow up as every child does, experience all the sensations of every growing child, grow to become a man with real feelings, real physicality, real sensations, real thoughts. He lived among us as a man — not "pretend man"— everything about Him was fully and completely human.

He became one of us for a purpose: — so that He could die in our place. As one author has put it: "He lived the life that we were supposed to but could not and died the death that we deserved but now need not." (Contemplate on this for a while.) All that he came to do . . . all that He accomplished . . . all that He was (and is) . . . comes to us as a Gift.

Early Christians began to express their joy in that gift by giving gifts to one another, in that way following Christ's example (so now we have wrapped presents). A third-century follower of Jesus became well-known for his gift-giving; his name was Nicholas. He became a bishop of the church, later was named as a saint, and over the years his name got mangled in English as Santa Claus

("Saint Nicholas"). And on and on the customs were added — some of them religious, some of them actually spiritual, many of them pagan in origin. As people came to these shores with the customs of their own land, they became amalgamated into the American version.

So now we have this confusion. But it's very simple to sort through — keep your eye on the manger. Don't let the sparkly lights or the flickering candles distract you. Don't pay attention to the red-suited man or his sled and animals. Don't be caught up in tinsel and tawdry, gaudy and jingling accretions (Yes, you may look up that word).

Look at the manger and see God Himself with Us! If you keep looking there, you will find inexpressible joy this Advent and Christmas.


Our Christmas Schedule of Worship Services


