

Confession and Forgiveness

P: In the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

P: Blessed is the one whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered.

C: Blessed is the one against whom the Lord counts no iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no deceit.

- P: Today, as every day, we are confronting death—not only physical death, but the death of relationships, the death that is sin, the daily experience others call "life" in this fallen world. Because Jesus has the power to call forth life out of death, we call to him for help. We confess our death, recalling our baptism into Christ, and listen for his life-giving word by which he forgives our sin daily and fills us with faith, hope and love. We join in that confession.
- C: Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on us. "Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are indeed cut off." [Ezekiel 37:11] Forgive us our sins. Bring us forth from death and give us your life that is eternal. Amen.
- P: "Behold, I will open your graves and raise you from your grave, O my people," [Ezekiel 37:12] Upon this your confession, I, by virtue of my office as a called and ordained servant of the Word, announce the grace of God to all of you, and in the stead and by the command of our Lord Jesus Christ, I forgive you all your sins, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, + and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

C: We are approaching the passion and death of our Lord.

P: But, Your words will see us through, O God.

C: For You are the God who calls "life" from death.

P: Breathe Your breath of life into us, O God. Then we will have voices that will shout the wondrous message Your Son has given:

C: "I am the resurrection and the life!"

P: Through Jesus Christ, Your Son, our Lord. He lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now...

C: and forever. Amen.

All readings are from the New Revised Standard Version The First Lesson Ezekiel 37:1-14

The hand of the LORD came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. ²He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. ³He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord GOD, you know." ⁴Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. ⁵Thus says the Lord GOD to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. ⁶I will lay sinews on you and will cause flesh to come upon you and cover you with skin and put breath in you, and you shall live, and you shall know that I am the LORD."

⁷So I prophesied as I had been commanded, and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. ⁸I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them, but there was no breath in them. ⁹Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord GoD: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." ¹⁰I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

¹¹ Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' ¹² Therefore prophesy and say to them: Thus says the Lord GoD: I am going to open your graves and bring you up from your graves, O my people, and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. ¹³ And you shall know that I am the LORD when I open your graves and bring you up from your graves, O my people. ¹⁴ I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the LORD, have spoken and will act, says the LORD." This is the word of the Lord.

Psalm Hymn: "Out of the Depths I Cry to You" (Psalm 130) No. 295

Second Lesson Romans 8:6-11

⁶To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. ⁷For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed, it cannot, ⁸ and those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

⁹But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. ¹⁰But if Christ is in you, then the body is dead because of sin, but the Spirit is life because of righteousness. ¹¹If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you. This is the word of the Lord.

Gospel Verse Pg. 63

Return to the Lord your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and abounding in steadfast love.

Holy Gospel John 11:1-45 C: **Glory to you, O Lord.**

Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. ² Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. ³ So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." ⁴ But when Jesus heard it, he said, "*This illness does not lead to death; rather, it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it.*" ⁵ Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, ⁶ after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was.

⁷Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again." ⁸The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?" ⁹Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble because they see the light of this world. ¹⁰But those who walk at night stumble because the light is not in them." ¹¹After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him." ¹²The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right." ¹³Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. ¹⁴Then Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. ¹⁵For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us

go to him." ¹⁶ Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

days. ¹⁸ Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, ¹⁹ and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. ²⁰ When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. ²¹ Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. ²² But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." ²³ Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." ²⁴ Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." ²⁵ Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, ²⁶ and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" ²⁷ She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

²⁸ When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary and told her privately, "The Teacher is here and is calling for you." ²⁹ And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. ³⁰ Now Jesus had not yet come to the village but was still at the place where Martha had met him. ³¹ The Jews who were with her in the house consoling her saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. ³² When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died." ³³ When Jesus saw her weeping and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. ³⁴ He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." ³⁵ Jesus began to weep. ³⁶ So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" ³⁷ But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

³⁸ Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. ³⁹ Jesus said, "*Take away the stone*." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." ⁴⁰ Jesus said to her, "*Did I not tell you that if you believed you would see the glory of God?*" ⁴¹ So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "*Father, I thank you for having heard me.* ⁴² *I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me.*" ⁴³ When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "*Lazarus, come out!*" ⁴⁴ The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "*Unbind him, and let him go.*"

⁴⁵ Many of the Jews, therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did believed in him. This is the Gospel of our Lord.

P: We do not presume to come to Your table, merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in Your manifold and great mercies.

C: We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under Your table. But You are the same Lord whose nature is always to have mercy.

P: Blessed are You, gracious Lord, and blessed is Your dear Son,

Jesus Christ, who feeds us with His own flesh and blood that we may evermore dwell in Him and He is us. Consuming Him and consumed by Him we are thus strengthened to walk in His footsteps, even knowing that to do so will inflame the fury of hell. We bless You for Christ, who has gone on before us, enduring the cross and disregarding its shame, to open a new trail for all to follow, a trail of justice and liberating peace, which presses on through suffering and beyond, all the way to the banqueting room of heaven.

Blessed is our brother Jesus, the pioneer and perfector of our faith; who, on the night when He was betrayed, took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and said:

"This is My body, which is for you.

Do this to remember Me."

In the same way also the cup, after supper, saying:

"This cup is the new covenant in My blood, Do this, whenever you drink it, to remember Me."

So, as we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the mystery of our faith;

C: Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again.

P: Therefore, here in this place, we celebrate the life that was born at Bethlehem, the life that Jesus has shared among his community through the centuries, and shares with us now.

Made one with Him, and thus one with each other, we lay before You these gifts of bread and wine, in token of our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, for here we offer and present to You ourselves, our bodies, minds and spirits, to be a holy and continuous sacrifice to You.

Come, now, O Spirit of Christ. Brood over these bodily things, this Bread and this wine.

- C: May they be for us Your body and blood, vibrant with life, healing, renewing and making us whole.
- P: And embrace us with Your life-giving power, that as bread and wine are made one with us, we may become one with You:
- C: Bone of Your bone, flesh of Your flesh, living our prayer and praying our life until love and fidelity embrace, peace and justice kiss, and all are free as Christ is free.
- P: Because You are one with us, O Christ, make us one with You as we pray the prayer You taught us:

Lord's Prayer

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy Name, Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread,
and forgive us our trespasses
as we forgive those who trespass against us;
and lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil;
for Thine is the Kingdom, and the power, and the
glory forever and ever. Amen.
