

Lent is a journey; it requires much of us. We are asked to increase our worship time, our prayer time, our meditation and devotional life. For many it is a season for fasting. For many it is a time of increased giving.

Above all else, it is a journey. We walk with Christ along the path to where we already know the journey will end: at His crucifixion and death.

This Lent, we will make some stops along the way each Sunday, as we engage some rather lengthy narratives for the Gospel of John. The events in those narratives set the stage for a series of discourses Jesus has with such people as Nicodemus, Mary and Martha, a man born blind. As we listen to them exchange words, we are edified in our understanding of what Jesus had to teach and why He had to take that journey eventually to Golgotha.

Each Wednesday, we examine one of the many ways our brokenness has been restored in Christ's Body. Sin has shattered our relationship with God; it damages our relationship with others; it even distorts our self-understanding. In Christ, we find restoration in all these areas of life.

Why do we take this annual pilgrimage? Our Lord bids us come with Him, learn from Him, and walk beside Him. That is our baptismal invitation. We begin this Lenten journey being marked by ashes in the form of a cross — a reminder of how we were marked by the same time when we were baptized. We want to know more deeply what that mark means for our lives.

Part of its meaning is that we are joined to fellow-travelers. It is with them that we learn how to love, how to care, how to support, and how to nurture as Christ continually nurtures us. As the ancient Hebrews marked forty years in the wilderness, and came to recognize it as a time when God was preparing them to be His people, so we spend forty days with Christ and one another preparing to live as Christ's people.

Lent is also a time for prayer, in which we learn that praying involves as much listening as speaking. We desire to make our needs known to God (which is kind of silly, since He already knows them); but we rarely spend as much time listening to discover what He wants from us. Lent is a time to seize the opportunity to step back from the busy-ness of life, come into the presence of God, and listen — just listen — as He helps us hear His voice.

We are a pilgrim people. We walk with Christ; we walk toward Christ. We walk together, because any pilgrimage requires others alongside to sustain us and direct us. Whenever we think we can walk alone, we start to wander off the path.

Let this Lent be an "us" time — a time of coming together, worshiping together, sharing meals together, praying together, working together, helping one another, lifting up one another, strengthening one another. As we journey together with Jesus and are restored in Him, we can discover anew the joy that the destination leads ever past Golgotha to the empty tomb, as we will walk with the risen and ascended Christ.

So our Lenten Journey is a journey of hope and of promise, of deliverance and forgiveness, of knowing yet again to boundless love of God.

Sermon: "We Weep . . . Like Jesus"

Texts: Ezekiel 37:1-14; Psalm 130; Romans 8:6-11; John 11:1-45

At the death of His friend, Jesus weeps, as do we in the face of death. But we

weep with hope.

# Lenten Midweek 2023 — The Body of Christ

When we began to share Pastor Just's leadership with Epiphany in Northfield, we moved our Lenten Midweek services to Thursdays; when Epiphany was closed, we simply continued the practice. In anticipation that we may need to make a similar accommodation with Christ in Mantua when we share a new pastor, we will again this year gather on Thursdays.

Our Lenten series for 2023 will focus on the Body of Christ. We began on Ash Thursday, February 23, and join together each Thursday through the season. Each midweek service begins at 7:30 PM.

Beginning March 2, we will offer a Soup Supper, from 6:30 to 7:30 PM. Come join us for a time of fellowship, enjoy some good (usually homemade) soup, and stay to worship.



## March 2 — Lenten Midweek 1

Sermon: "The Mouth of Christ"

Texts: Deuteronomy 8:1-3; Psalm 81; Romans 3:10-18; Luke 4:14-22a

From Christ's mouth comes all manner of blessings, which we, in turn, pass on to others.




## March 9 — Lenten Midweek 2

#### March 30 — Lenten Midweek 5

Sermon: "The Heart of Christ"

Texts: Jeremiah 3:12-18; Psalm 51; Hebrews 8:8-12; John 11:17-44

Jesus taught his disciples to not let their hearts be troubled. His heart was the

ultimate model for how ours are to work.

Given that March weather can be somewhat erratic (you can read there, "nasty"), we will try to alert you when the weather makes our midweek activities less than attractive. Unless you hear to the contrary via a phone call, we will hold our Soup Supper and Midweek Service each Thursday at the scheduled time. Pastor Just is in the office each Thursday from morning to evening, so he can make the decision by 5:30 for a cancel notice to be sent out.



A request came from Lutheran World Relief (LWR) for assistance with their response to the horrible earthquake that damaged Turkey and Syria. The immediate request is for donations to help send support for the relief efforts that are needed right now. If you can offer such a donation, please look to LWR.org and use their website to donate.

Aware that some of their response will involve the various kits that organizations (like St. Thomas) have assembled and shared over the years, Pastor suggested, and Council agreed, that it might be well for us to assemble **Personal Care Kits** and to make this a project for Lent.

Each wee	ek in	Lent	we will	invite	our	member	s to	bring	in th	e fol	lowing	items	for	each	kit:	

- ☐ March 5: Two or three bath-size bars of soap (8-9 oz. any brand in original wrapping)
- ☐ March 12: One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- ☐ March 19: One sturdy comb, remove packaging.
- ☐ March 26: One metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging.
- ☐ April 2: One lightweight, bath-sized towel (between 20"x40" and 52"x27"), dark color recommended.

The week after Easter, we will then assemble the kits by wrapping the first items in the bath towel and securing the kit with yarn, string, ribbon, or rubber bands. The kits can then be boxed and shipped to LWR in Baltimore. There will be a need for cash to offset the cost of shipping.

We made such an effort a few years ago in conjunction with Epiphany, Northfield. We will ask our sister congregation, Christ Lutheran, Mantua, to join us. Can we aim for at least 50 kits this Lent? With your help, we can probably accomplish that.
