

In middle school, I never enjoyed the end of the church year. Why? At the end of the church year, our lectionary readings are all about Christ's return in Glory. One aspect of Christ's return in glory is the final judgment. We confess in the Apostles' Creed that Christ "will return to judge the living and the dead." Christ describes this judgment in Matthew 25:31-46 with the parable of the sheep and the goats. "When the Son of Man comes in His Glory, and all the angels with Him, then He will sit on His throne of Glory. Before Him will be gathered all the nations, and He will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats." (Matthew 25:31-32) The righteous (those who have a right standing with God) will go into eternal life, and the unrighteous (those who do not have a right standing with God) will go into everlasting punishment (Matthew 25:46). I was terrified of this judgment because I was not sure that I would be included among the righteous.


Some passages in Scripture describe Christ judging us according to our works. St. Paul writes: "He will render to each one according to His works: to those who by patience in well-doing seek for glory and honor and immortality, he will give eternal life; but for those who are self-seeking and do not obey the truth, but obey unrighteousness, there will be wrath and fury." (Romans 2:6-8) If we are judged on the final day according to everything we have done, then we are indeed lost. There would be no hope for us. We could only approach that day with fear and trembling. Everyone has sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, as St. Paul says elsewhere (Romans 3:23). Such statements about Christ's final judgment are meant to terrify the sinner. It helps us to realize that on our own, apart from Christ Jesus, none of us can stand before the judgment seat of Christ as the righteous. They reveal to us the insufficiency of our own merits and worthiness.

However, for those who believe in Christ Jesus, there is no need to fear the final judgment. The Christians will not stand before the divine throne clinging to their own righteousness; they will stand covered in Christ's righteousness. Christ has canceled the record of our sin by suffering the consequences of our sin on the cross for us (Colossians 2:14). By dying on the cross, He performed the perfect act of righteousness in obedience to the will of God for us, in turn making us righteous in God's sight (Romans 5:18). Therefore, Christ will come on that final day, not as our judge, but as our advocate (1 John 2:1). He delivers us from the wrath to come (1 Thessalonians 1:10). For this reason, the Christian can approach the last hour confidently, knowing that they have a good standing with God on account of what Christ has done. The only thing they have to look forward to on the final day is eternal life. As Christ promises: "Whoever trusts in [Christ] is not judged...." (John 3:18)

Finance Report

Treasurer's finance notice

Inflation and recent capital improvements of parking lot sealing, concrete leveling & cleaning and the lawn tractor repairs have increased the 2023 YTD expenses by \$7,754 compared to YTD 2022.

A comparison of these YTD expenses is below.

Pastoral support is currently 2/3 of total expense. Our shared expense with Christ Lutheran Church for Pastor Blake is currently \$2,787.45 per month. This covers our portion of his salary, housing, utilities, mileage re-imbursement, retirement, disability/ survivor insurance and most of the health care premium.

The increase in expenses is more than offset by an increase in our offerings as our YTD totals for attendance and offerings have both increased in 2023 compared to 2022. We also have significant savings in a Thrivent Money Market account that is currently earning about \$9/ day.

Thank you to all who support of our congregation and its ministry with your time and talents as well as monetary donations.

We have not had a stewardship program in many years and are intending to start one soon. We are looking for volunteers to be on the stewardship committee. The function of our stewardship committee is to evoke and promote the expression of Christian faith in daily living. It shall teach the Christian use of money, and spread knowledge of the Congregation's local, national and world-wide ministries. It shall lead all its members to higher levels of proportionate giving for the Lord's work. It shall also be responsible for other congregation efforts, which lead to informed and grateful giving.

about many doing little and accomplishing much. \$211,915 has been received by our District, above and beyond our regular District budget, to support and strengthen identified missions of our District as designated by Bishop Hardy. Our 2022-2023 identified missions were *Logos, Philadelphia*, *PA* and *Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ukraine*. Each of these missions received half of the gifts received. Our 2023-2024 identified recipients are the new LCMS-U chapter at Eastern Washington University, Cheney, Washington led by Pastor Marc DiConti and the Nuer Language (South Sudanese) Ministry at the Church of St. Mark - Lutheran, Mississauga, Ontario led by Pastor Philip Gai.

Of the 59 congregations that have participated over the years, 27 have participated every year. The dream has always been that every English District congregation would participate. To renew our emphasis of 1-1-1 we are intentionally focusing this year with the theme of "1-1-1 REIGNITED!" Bishop Hardy was recently interviewed by Rev. Thomas Engler about this renewed emphasis. 
